From the Vicarage

Dear Friends,

Normally I would write about things that instantly seem positive, this time however I am going to talk about fear.

Every time you turn on the news, its full of difficulties, sorrow, war and disaster, not to mention the misery of our present politics. Nothing positive is said and it is perfectly clear



that both sides of the Brexit debate have knowingly used fear to influence not just the original vote but our ongoing perspectives. This may or may not be a good way of getting votes, but it can't be the right thing to do, surely?

The effects of fear are well known. It raises anxiety levels and if you speak to healthcare professionals, they will tell you that anxiety leads to bowel complaints, respiratory illness, heart conditions and that's before we get to depression and other mental health issues. As Dietrich Bonhoeffer (probably my favourite theologian) said\:

"Fear is, somehow or other, the archenemy itself. It crouches in people's hearts. It hollows out their insides, until their resistance and strength are spent and they suddenly break down. Fear secretly gnaws and eats away at all the ties that bind a person to God and to others, and when in a time of need that person reaches for those ties and clings to them, they break and the individual sinks back into himself or herself, helpless and despairing".







Electoral Roll Lucy Earl

A n entirely new Church Electoral Roll must be prepared this year. Whether you are on the current roll or not, everyone will need to sign a new form of application to join and be included on the new roll.



It is important that we prepare a new roll which accurately reflects membership of the church. The

roll is the nearest thing we have to a local membership list. By joining the roll, it shows that you want to be known as an active member of this church. One further purpose of the roll is to enable the Diocese to measure our health as a church and it plays a significant part in decisions on resourcing.

Forms of application are being issued to all those on the current roll from 20th January and need to be completed by **20th February**. Additional forms are available in Church, or from Paul Seymour or me, for those considering joining the roll for the first time. The new roll will be prepared and displayed in advance of the Annual Meeting on the 24th March. An Ethnicity Monitoring form is also included to assist the Diocese in its understanding of the diversity of the community it serves.

Completed forms must be returned to the Box in Church or to Lucy Earl (4 Scotts View, Welwyn Garden City, AL8 6HF) as soon as you are able and by 20^{th} February at the latest.

Ramblers Walking Holidays

Ramblers Walking Holidays have supported St John's Church in many ways. They have advertised on the back page of the Parish Magazine for years, and have been generous when asked for help with the Fete, or other special events. They are also important to the Village as occupiers of The Old Mill. But how much do you know about them as an organisation? Over the coming year we plan to write up their history and achievements.

Ramblers Walking Holidays are a Social Organisation with the Mission Statement "To generate funds for walking charities by providing outstanding outdoor activity holidays worldwide". The company began life in 1946 as a part of The Ramblers Association, now simply The Ramblers. It



sought to encourage the peacetime spirit of discovery of Europe's mountainous landscapes and at the same time generate funds. These were intended to support its campaigning and encourage participation in its local walking groups around the country.

Although separating from The Ramblers when it achieved charitable status in 1970, the organisation's purpose and philosophy remained unchanged. All profits generated from the organisation's holiday operations which are not required to be ploughed back into the company are invested into a charitable trust and other environmental and conservation projects.

They continue to support The Ramblers at a national level by disbursements though the Ramblers Holidays Charitable Trust. At local level they provide direct financial support to local walking clubs through an initiative called Walking Partnership.

They also have a venture called Heart & Sole, which aims to make a real difference to the people living in the places to which they travel. This supports small projects in the developing destinations, which include SOS Children's Villages in Costa Rica, Cape Verde, Malawi and Morocco.

The Jaguar showroom in the Stanborough area has moved to a new 20-million-pound building on the Hatfield business park. The showroom is now the home for the McLaren sports car and Aston Martin are still in the old Shell garage building. I have been informed both will join Jaguar in six months at the business park. An unofficial source has told me two new franchises will move in and it will stay a showroom for cars. Watch this space.

To many readers calling the garage 'the Shell garage' will bring back memories and to help the little grey cells I have found a photo (*inside back cover*) from the archives that shows the working petrol station on a very busy Great North Road in the 1960s.

Many years ago I was asked to take a photo that matched this image for a before and after article. I thought it was taken from a bedroom window at number 3 Great North Road. At the time the occupant of that address was a larger than life character called Fred and his lovely wife Mary. Fred provided many stories about the area and refused to accept the address 3 Great North Road and insisted the post Office called the address 3 Bury Cottages its original name, which they did.

Fred informed me the photo was taken from a footbridge that crossed the road next to number one GNR. I followed this up by finding two concrete blocks with bolts in them next to number one GNR (foundations of the bridge) and on the opposite side of the road a matching set. They are still there today, not quite The Hanging Gardens of Babylon, but worth a look if in the area.

Do you have a relative buried in Lemsford Churchyard?
Barbara Taylor writes: The Group is making preparations for Lemsford's annual Fete, held this year on Monday 6th May. Many families visit the churchyard regularly and we thought they might like to write something about those buried here. 

Went to a pancake restaurant, and asked if my dinner would be long. "No, sir, round" came the reply.




