

sits by Jesus to listen to him as he talks; she's happy to just be in his presence. Martha, understandably, is a bit peeved by this - after all, she is doing all the work of providing a meal. But Jesus gently rebukes her by saying, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her." (Luke 10:41-42). Martha is unable to focus on Jesus and stillness; she is letting other priorities get in the way of spending quality time with him, while Mary has managed to let the 'to-do list' go for a while and give all her attention to what matters.

Of course, we all need to be both Martha and Mary; having one without the other would mean that either no tasks get done or we would not be spending time in prayer or stillness. It is not either/or, but both/and. However, if we've recently been busy being a frantic Martha, perhaps August could be a time to take a leaf out of Mary's book, pause from all that doing, and just stop, be still, and rest in whatever ways work best for us. Since the last Parish Magazine, we have celebrated the 165-year anniversary of St John's, given Bill Dance a wonderful send off and enjoyed a Church fundraiser at one of the loveliest houses in the village when Edna hosted 'The Strawberry Teas'.

The 'Strawberry Teas' is an annual event for the parish to raise funds for the church and, like the anniversary celebration, was a great success due to all the hard work by volunteers, too many to mention.

Our host at the 'Strawberry Teas' was Edna. Edna's house is known historically as 'Cress Cottage' and has a long and interesting history. Similar in a way to Edna herself who is another unsung hero in the parish. She has spent over 30 years providing her time and her house for hundreds of events to raise money for various causes such as 'Jazz on the Island' and Easter egg hunts, which I fondly remember. Edna is also involved in a special charity. She helps raise funds for the girls of the Altevette Project in Nepal. They provide warm clothing for the girls and their teachers. There are 53 girls and 9 teachers and they visit the school and deliver clean warm clothes such as leggings, tracksuit trousers, joggers, hats, scarfs and gloves. research done by Carol and Doreen from which Doreen produced an excellent article about Jean Dance.

'Bill Dance was born in London in 1932 and moved to Surrey, before moving to the Brocket Estate in Hertfordshire where his father had taken up work. His work ethic was instilled in him at an early age, and he recounted to me how he used to wake up early in the morning to help bring the cows in from the fields and milk them. He said at this point in his life he was running at least 10 miles a day. When I asked him why he ran, he said simply 'It's quicker than walking!'



The next part of
Granddad's story is
perhaps the most
significant and life
altering for him, and
indeed for us, his family.
And it happened one
night in the Lemsford
Village Hall where, as a
young man, our
Granddad met our

Nanny – Jean Dance. Their introduction was brief, but the leader of the group asked Granddad to walk Nanny back home. As a true gentleman, he did so and as many of us know, Nanny and Granddad were married for over 65 years, until her passing in 2017.

They were inseparable, and you'd rarely find one without the other. Bill and Jean Dance had two sons – Chris and Dave, followed by 5 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren.

Jean was born on 18th June 1932 in Cromer Hyde and baptised at St John's Church Lemsford on 9th October 1932. Her parents were James Saunders a Farm Labourer and Maggie Hawthorne, they also had a son James Sydney Saunders born 26th July 1921 and baptised 1st July 1921 at St John's Church Lemsford.

Jean was admitted to St. John's School on 1st September 1937. Miss Lines a teacher at the school had a lot to do with the church choir and

encouraged Jean to join when she was 8 years, Jean remained in the choir for many years.

She also helped at the Sunday School when 11 years old and then became a Sunday School Teacher. Jean left St John's School when 11 years old to go to St. Mary's Secondary School Welwyn, she left when 14 years and went on to learn shorthand and typing.

Her first job was at County Hall Hertford, she cycled every day from Cromer Hyde. She left after 18 months and went to Furamic Industries Hydeway (Enamel works) to work and was there for 35 years.'

Doreen's article confirms Georgia account of their brief encounter that became a lifelong partnership.

'Bill was interested in the farm and encouraging boys with their boxing also he enjoyed running. One night on a run up Lemsford hill past the Youth Club Mr Crafts was coming out of the club, he asked Bill if he would escort Jean to her home along the Wheathampsted Road to Cromer Hyde, she was on her bike and Bill ran. On the Sunday she went to the farm to look at the calves, this was the start of their life together. They were married on 26th January 1952 they were both 19 years old.

Bill left the Farm and went to work at the Box Factory, after a few years Bill became Plant Superintendent, then Production Manager. The company ran a Christmas Party for the 250 employees' children 5 to 12 years olds it was chaos. Jean offered to help and became the Social Secretary and met with the managers, she had the 9 to 12 year olds at a pantomime and the others at a party. She met a rep from a toy company and persuaded him to be the Father Christmas and got the toy company to supply at a special rate presents for the children. Jean became interested in the social side of the factory and made the teas for the Cricket Club.

In 1965 Bill and Jean went to the London Palladium where they were called up on to the stage, Norman Vaughan presented Jean with a dressing table set and Bill with a tie decorated with beat the clock logos.

Jean encouraged Bill to do training to gain more knowledge in all aspects of his work, he went to Loughborough college. He travelled abroad to buy machinery. The company asked for him to organise a bonus scheme for the employees, Jean helped him, he went to Watford College for a month's training.

When the youth club started up with Stan Horsley, she helped him and was also the treasurer. Bill was asked to run the scout group, he did it for 2 years, Jean sorted the finance when it closed, she handed over the equipment to Hatfield Scout Group. She held on to the money for 2 years then passed it to the Hatfield group.

Jean was a governor at St. John's School as well as Howard Secondary School WGC. Jean was also a governor of this school and helped to get the swimming pool for them.

Jean ran the Old Folks Club Lemsford (Lemsford Old Peoples Welfare Committee) which started in approximately 1947. They had 70 people for the annual Christmas lunch, Jean along with another lady did all the cooking. She liked to always be in the background and never put herself forward to be in photographs. They put a lot of time and effort into raising funds for the social enjoyment of the Club. There was also an annual coach trip to the seaside. She met the Queen twice at Buckingham Palace.

Bill umpired at Lords, umpired the Rest of the World II, Chairman of the league, Senior vice president to Herts Association, he has been associated with this association for 70 years, also Vice president of the Police. Georgia informs us 'Granddad also left a lasting legacy in the world of golf. Granddad was a brilliant golfer, who frequently rose early in the morning to be on the course in time for the first tee time. He played for the county and at one point held a handicap of 12. In the later years of his life, Granddad took on the role of 'Chief Game Collation and Suspension Officer' at the Knebworth Park Shoot. In so many areas of Granddad's life, his quiet, modest efforts were often unseen but were essential for the smooth running of the groups he was involved in.

They did everything together, whatever Bill did Jean always supported him, she was very involved with Cricket and did a course in

Cricket scoring. There is a plaque to Jean at Knebworth Park Cricket Club.

They were friendly with Lord McLaren (Tesco) and went to his son's wedding. They both liked Old-Time dancing and had an invitation from the Sydney Thompson Orchestra.'

Bill and Jean were a major force in getting Lemsford Parish a village Hall built and then ran it for many years. What becomes apparent with Georgia's and Doreen's articles is how much is owed by the Lemsford community to Jean and Bill and it endorses the comment of editor Frank who reminds us of Rev Kathryn's thoughts on generosity writing on the theme of generosity [June/July Edition] – "not just financial, but the whole thing" I think Bill and Jean were the whole nine yards" \*

Jean was a member of the Lemsford History Group which was grateful to her for her history of Lemsford, Stanborough and Cromer Hyde. My own personal memory of Jean was a local history subject or question would come up and it would draw a blank. I would ask Jean if she recalled the subject, and she would know everything about it. As Doreen observed 'She liked to always be in the background and never put herself forward '. Many of the photos we have to share with the community are there because of Jean.



She was a staunch church goer at St John's until her illness prevented her attending on a regular basis. She loved her garden and used her flowers to decorate the church. Jean went to the church 2 – 3 times a week, cleaning and

arranging flowers. Her kindness and strength were very apparent to all who knew her.

'Amongst all of his many accolades, Granddad was a devoted husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather. We all have our own memories of Granddad, which we will cherish.'

\* Where does the expression "the whole nine yards" come from? The bullets for the machine guns used in American combat planes of WW2 and ever since were in chains twenty-seven feet in length. Thus if a pilot was able to fire all his bullets off at one target he was said to have given his adversary 'the full nine yards'. It means "everything" or "the full extent of something" and describes someone or something as having, desiring, or giving their all in a certain situation. That perfectly describes Jean And Bill.

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A highlight of the Strawberry Teas by the river Lee was the sudden appearance of a young Kingfisher. It arrived without fanfare, carried safely in the hands of Barry Trevis [see cover photo]. He held the bird up and explained to the crowd that had suddenly gathered round him all the details of this wonderful creature.

Kingfishers, like other endangered birds, have special protection under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. Barry has a Licence issued by the British Trust for Ornithology under this Act which allows him to trap them in a special humane mist net in order to ring them. He showed the ring that he had just fitted to this bird, which he estimated had been born in Lemsford Springs around May. Bird ringing enables the monitoring of their populations, particularly their movements and survival rates.

What was impressive was the way that the bird lay impassively in his hand because Barry was holding it correctly. It showed absolutely no fear or alarm. Indeed, when Barry tipped it gently onto its back it even seemed to fall asleep. However, when released it flew off at great speed.

Few if any of we spectators had ever been so close to this amazingly colourful bird. It was cheering to see the many children looking in wonder at this masterpiece of nature, and drinking in Barry's words about the need to protect them.


Barry has worked voluntarily at the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust's Lemsford Springs reserve since 1977 and has been its honorary Warden since 1981; he is reckoned to be the longest-serving Warden in the county. He and Lyn have lived by the Springs for over 40 years, and one can understand why when visiting this idyllic spot.

Barry catches many species of birds. His colour-ringing of Green Sandpipers at Lemsford Springs started in 1983 and is now the longest running project of its kind on waders in Europe. GPS geolocation technology has made it possible to use tagged birds to establish migration routes and breeding sites in Scandinavia.

In the next issue I plan to write about a rare orchid that has been sighted locally, and the way that Lyn has protected it from mowing by the Council; truly, an inspiring couple.
