

Progress in filling our Vacancy

It is now 5 months since Edward retired as our Vicar and the process for selecting a replacement is moving on. Because we are in the Bishop's Hatfield Team, the new Vicar will be a Team Vicar. This means that there are organisational issues as well as the personal qualities of the prospective candidate to match our church's style and aspirations to be considered. We are not the only vacancy in the team; there are two others, namely, at St John's Hilltop and St Michael's Birchwood.

The clergy group have made one suggestion but have not provided any information on alternatives which might have been considered or the rationale for their suggestion. As a result, the PCC have felt that we have not been properly consulted and have expressed their concerns to the Bishop of St Albans. Therefore, Bishop Alan has invited a retired bishop to cast a fresh pair of eyes over this situation and advise him. The person leading this is Bishop Stephen Venner, formerly Bishop of Dover, who is now living in our diocese. I have had one brief meeting with him and have sent him copies of the letters I had sent to Bishop Alan; our Mission Action Plan; and a copy of our magazine.

Bishop Stephen brings immense experience to such situations and we are very privileged that he is taking on this role. Please do pray that the Holy Spirit will guide us and Bishop Stephen with all wisdom as he considers the way ahead for us at St. John's.

Over the past few weeks, we have been preparing the children in class and assemblies for centenary commemoration of WW1. We held our

own 'Remembrance Service' on 11th November and had the reading of *In Flanders Field* by John McCrae, two minutes silence and the Last Post, after which we all sang 'I Vow to Thee My Country'. After this every child and member of staff took out a poppy they had made and created our own 'Tower of London' display by the school gate. The names of those who died in the conflicts of WW1 and WW2 were written of the front of particular poppies. This has been a very moving experience for us all.

Some two thousand years ago in the occupied Middle East, a small group of men and women gathered in a closed room in a packed city to pray together. They had just witnessed the most extraordinary events in human history – the death of the Son of God at the hands of the Roman authorities and the religious elite, his resurrection from the dead some three days later, and his ascension into heaven forty days after that. The Bible tells us there were just 120 of them. They were wanted people, associated with a man who had challenged every belief and principle of society, who had asserted that anyone could know God and that he and he alone was the way to God. They were the church!

Church tradition has moved on a long way since then, but Christians still meet together, to share the good news of Jesus, to pray, to read the Bible, to eat together and enjoy each other's company, and to support those in need. At St John's we have always offered lots of different ways for Christians to meet, drawing on different traditions and experiences. Since September we've added another regular service, Café Church!

Elizabeth Kathleen Potter 24/6 1943—17/9 2014

The Service of Thanksgiving for the life of Liz Potter was held in the Church on Friday 10th October. It could have been nowhere else as she was so involved with St John's, and our community owed her a great deal. Her father was killed in Italy in the war so she grew up an only child with her mother, Pat Woodcock. One of the



comments at the Service was that this had turned her into a tough old bird—pun fully intended. She worshipped at St John's with her mother and sang with her (as an alto) in the choir. Much later on she was a Churchwarden for many years who—as wardens do—worked very hard to keep the show on the road.

Another major contribution was to Chair the Fete Committee from 1984. She and her husband Alan were planning the event virtually the whole year round. They were very much hands on: Alan would haul large items from their house in the Garden City up to the field, on a trailer towed behind their trusty car. Liz was everywhere directing and encouraging. When things got a bit hectic she would "pop over to the Church to have a quick prayer".

Her day job was initially as a nurse but she moved to John Lewis which is where she met Alan. She formed the local RSPB Group, taught swimming to the disabled, was Secretary of the Welwyn Garden City Music society Chorus for six years, and still found time to organise the kneelers in Church; she recorded every one and made a few herself. Alan and she were keen supporters of the Organ Museum in St Albans atterly she had a rough time. First she lost Alan, then a melanoma appeared on her foot which developed into a very painful large ulcer. She was in and out of hospital for several years to no avail and her friends in the Church rallied round to help with her chores and getting her there and back. She still managed to hobble up to the altar at Communion but it was clearly a painful struggle. This summer she went down hill quickly. Sue Stilwell our Curate was with her at the very end of her life and felt that Liz was at peace with herself and with God.

A humbling visit to Africa

y employer, Roche Product Ltd (the UK affiliate of Hoffmann-La Roche, Switzerland), supports orphan children in Malawi. Every year since 2003 they have run a global charitable event, the Roche Children's Walk, a lunchtime local walk, for which participants find as many sponsors as they can. This has raised more than £7 million. To encourage participation, Roche award a trip to Africa



for the most successful fund raisers, to see how their funds are being spent. Having raised £600 in two consecutive years, I had achieved global ambassador status as the top fundraiser at Welwyn and was lucky enough to be chosen this year to visit Malawi.

In October I flew to Johannesburg where I met eight other global ambassadors whose role is to raise awareness of the charity and report back to their local affiliates on progress. This year representatives came from Peru, USA (2x), The Netherlands, Switzerland (2x), Turkey, Hong Kong and the UK. On Tuesday, 7th October our group visited the cancer ward of a Johannesburg hospital and then the Maharishi Institute (http://maharishiinstitute.org/our-campus/johannesburg).

The latter was memorable for several reasons: firstly, there was an electrifying atmosphere created by a welcoming choir. Then there was the inspiring personality of the Institute's CEO (Taddy Blecher) who had given up a high profile career to help under-privileged youngsters obtain university degrees. And then the students themselves: three of them gave testimonies which were overwhelming evidence of the successful "inside out" teaching approach practised at the institute. Not the knowledge of the lecturing professor but the inner strength of the individual pupil is the focal point of the method.

The next morning we flew to Blantyre in southern Malawi. The scale of the poverty hit me hard. Even by African standards, Malawi is at the bottom of the pile.

The country has no significant exports in terms of minerals so it's difficult to build a growing economy. There is plenty of arable land but that's only arable during the rainy season due to lack of irrigation systems. And then there is the impact of AIDS – nearly 11% of the 17.3 million Malawians are HIV positive.



Most of the money raised by the Roche Walks benefits children in Malawi via the European Coalition of Positive People (ECPP). The ECCP is a non-governmental organization that works with local partners to provide care and support – most notably a daily meal - and ensures that the children can continue to live within their communities. Members of ECPP showed us around 2 (out of 8) local orphan daycare centres that have been set up by this charity. One of the local partners of ECCP is the "Comboni Technical College" in Lunzu. It was established by missionary brothers following in the steps of St Daniel Comboni, the 1st bishop of Central Africa and offers placements to pupils who have successfully completed their secondary education. The skills taught here include carpentry, welding and those of an electrician.

On the last day of our stay in Malawi we visited a teacher training college under construction. Following the spread of HIV in the 90s a vast number of people died of AIDS-related illnesses – including a lot of teachers. Class sizes in schools roared to 150 pupils and are still ~ 100 now in many regions. The new teacher training college - built by UNICEF and sponsored by Roche - is designed to address this problem: 450 teachers are to qualify each academic year from 2017.

Before I knew it this deeply moving experience came to an end. It has left me humbled by the children Malawi and the inspiring people that try so hard locally to improve their lives. What better words than those of South Africa's most famous son to sum up my impression: "Education is the most powerful weapon you can use to change the world"!


The power of the Internet

In our last issue we carried an article about the new WW1 website set up by the Lemsfod Local History Group to commemorate the Villagers who fell in the Great War. Andy Chapman reports that this has sparked a good deal of interest from around the world.

For example he has received a series of emails from a descendant of Thomas Chapman who was born in Cromer Hyde in 1872 and who won the British War Medal. The first enclosed a photo of a Lemsford School Stoolball Team from 1920/21 showing his daughter Millie. Andy sent back a picture of a Lemsford School play (The Enchanted Rose) in 1919 which had Millie in the cast (but not pictured). See the picture inside front cover.

From knowing very little about Tom Chapman we are now privileged to know about his Birth, Marriage and tragic death—he fell into a domestic fire at 14 Newfield WGC in 1955 (See the copy of his death Certificate opposite).

In conclusion, Tom marries Rose and lives in Cromer Hyde. They have 9 children and 8 survive. They all go there separate ways, but we know their husbands and wives, where they lived and worked. The power of the internet provides this window into the past.

Editor's note: Many thanks to Andy for giving the keynote address

during the Remembrance Service on November 9th, when he drew on the research behind the WW1 website to remind us of what life was like for Villagers during the Great War. Tim our Choir Director read the history of Gordon Panter the organist in 1914; Edie, choir member, read the history of Cecil White Captain of Lemsford FC 1908 -1914; both these men were killed in WW1. Thanks also to LLHG for laying on a display of framed history's of the men who died from Lemsford in WW1 in the Brocket Chapel.


