

Lemsford History

The Church's brass candlesticks were donated by Thomas Hovell who lived in Lemsford House and is buried with his wife Margaret in the south graveyard. The picture shows the imposing memorial Cross set over his grave near the Brocket Chapel. The candlesticks and other metalwork were thoroughly cleaned during the Church Spring Clean—see picture inside front cover. Hovell was a distinguished surgeon, whose obituary appeared in The Times, 1 July 1925 (researched by **Barbara Taylor).**

"THOMAS MARK HOVELL FRCS

Edinburgh, of 105 Harley St., and Lemsford House, Hatfield, has died at the age of 72. 37 years ago a battle raged over the illness and death of the German Crown Prince, later the Emperor Frederick. Hovell was surgeon to the hospital for diseases of the Throat and Ear in Golden Square, and when Dr Norris Wolfenden was obliged to resign his care of the Crown Prince after the first operation in June 1887 Hovell was invited to succeed him.



Hovell accepted the position of resident Physician, and accompanied his patient to Braemar in August, a few weeks after the first Jubilee procession [of Queen Victoria] in which the Crown Prince was such a notable figure. From this time onward with the exception of his father's death, Hovell was in constant attention until his illustrious patient died on June 13, 1888. During the whole of this time he assiduously kept records and supplied reports of the daily state, and by his skill, gentleness and tact so endeared himself that one of the Emperor's first acts was to confer upon him with his own hand the second class of the order of the Crown - a high distinction for one not of German birth. As Hovell was unable to speak a word of German, all communications with his subordinates must have been in English, or must have passed though a third person. There can be no doubt that Hovell came out of the controversy in a very successful manner. he was goaded occasionally to take part in it, but he usually went about his duties silently, confined himself to facts, and noted the steady downward course of the disease.

A fter the death of the Emperor, Hovell returned to London, was appointed Lecturer on Diseases of the Throat at the London Hospital, wrote a book on diseases of the ear. He enjoyed the confidence of all his professional brethren. Mr Hovell came of an ancient Suffolk family who held lands of the monastery at Bury St Edmunds in the reign of Edward the Confessor. He was the son of Dennis de Berdt Hovell FRCS, a general practitioner in Clapton E., who was at one time President of the Hunterian Society. He married in 1905 the Hon. Margaret Cecilia Bateman-Hanbury, daughter of the second Lord Bateman and leaves one son."

Sandra Maisey reports:

The Lemsford Local History Group held their first meeting of 2018 at the end of January. Following a recruitment campaign in December/January around 30 people attended to hear an interesting talk by Nik Pringle of Herts Constabulary on "Murders in Hertfordshire". Nik is a founder member & first secretary of the Herts Police Historical Society.

Currently there are an average of 6-10 murders a year in Hertfordshire a figure that had hardly changed in Nik's 38 years of Police service. He outlined some of Hertfordshires's headline murders. These included the murder in 1602 of Anthony James by Annis & George Dell, who cut out the victim's sisters tongue to prevent her giving evidence. However she confronted them 8 years later & "talked" (or so the popular folklore of the day states) thereby condemning both of them to be hanged. Nik went on to describe the more recent 2009 Jeffrey Howe aka the Jigsaw murders where body parts turned up all over Hertfordshire and equally locally the Janie Shepherd murder of 1977 and of course the notorious 1957 Deep Freeze Murder of Ann Noblett of Wheathamstead. This attracted a lot of interest in the audience some of whom remember their own houses being searched (particularly) if they had deep freezers at home.

The next meeting of the group will take place on **Thursday 7th June** at 7.30pm in Lemsford Village Hall."

The Resurrection, Cookham

Sir Stanley Spencer, 1924-27 Tate Britain





Spencer believed that the divine rested in all creation. He saw his home village of Cookham as a paradise in which everything was invested with mystical significance. The local churchyard here becomes the setting for the resurrection of the dead. Christ is enthroned in the church porch, cradling three babies, with God the Father standing behind. Spencer himself appears near the centre, naked, leaning against a grave stone; his fiancée Hilda lies sleeping in a bed of ivy. At the top left, risen souls are transported to Heaven in the pleasure steamers that then ploughed the Thames.
